

MORE THAN 300 DIFFERENT SIGN LANGUAGES IN

THE WORLD

SIGN LANGUAGES are fully fledged natural languages with their own grammar and lexicon. Sign languages are not universal. There are more than 300 sign languages in the world.

Sign languages are based on using eyes and hands and non-manual elements, so visual modality conveys meaning. Spoken languages are based on auditory modality.

Signs are like words in sign language.
Signs are represented as combinations of features:

- handshape (position of the fingers during the sign)

 location (signing area, in signer's body or in front of the signer)

 movement (hand movement during the sign)

 orientation (the position of the palm during the sign)
- of the mouth, head and body during the sign)





VIETNAMESE SIGN LANGUAGE (VSL)

THERE ARE ABOUT 1,200,000 Deaf people in Vietnam. They express themselves in sign language. There are three sign languages in Vietnam.

Signing is different in the areas of Ho Chi Minh City, Hanoi and Haiphong. They are part of a sign language area that includes the indigenous sign languages of Laos and Thailand, though it is not known if they are related to each other. There is also some influence from French Sign Language (FSL). There are attempts in Vietnam to develop a national standard language, Vietnamese Sign Language.

SIGN-SUPPORTED SPEECH

SIGNING SYSTEMS, for example "signed speech" or "sign supported speech", use signs drawn from a natural sign language. Signing systems use the grammar of the spoken language.

When people use one-for-one sign-for-word correspondences between spoken words and the signs that represent them, the system that results is a manual code for a spoken language rather than a natural sign language. Such systems may be invented to help teach Deaf children the spoken language or in the communication of hard-of-hearing persons who have lost their hearing as an adult.

FINGERSPELLING


FINGERSPELLING IS USED to spell out names, places, and words without a known sign. The manual alphabet contains handshapes that correspond to the letters of alphabet.


